



Wasp 1807 has a New Home

Tom Ruggiero built this model of Wasp. Wasp was the first ship built in the Washington DC Navy Yard in 1807. USS Wasp versus HMS Frolic was an action fought in the Atlantic on October 18th 1812, the sloop-of-war USS Wasp, was commanded by Master Commandant Jacob Jones, and the brig-sloop Frolic, was under Commander Thomas Whinyates. After 22 minutes, the Americans captured the British vessel, but 4 hours later both vessels were captured by a British ship of the line (HMS Poictiers 74-third rate) which happened upon the scene of the battle.

Recently, Bill Brown and Tom were contacted by the Lewes Delaware Historical Society inquiring about the model of the Wasp. Tom has brought the Wasp to Lewes where it will be on permanent display in the oldest house, and still on its original foundation, in Delaware.

The exhibit is "Boy, Man, Hero: Jacob Jones - Lewes' Own" opening at the Ryves Holt House, 218 Second Street, Lewes, DE 19958 -Jacob Jones was born in Smyrna, Delaware but lived in the Ryves Holt House for much of his formative years, with the town of Lewes having a dramatic early impact on raising a future naval hero. This Exhibition will highlight three periods of Jones' life, focusing on his upbringing in Lewes, his rising naval career, and the legacy of his life and service. The exhibit will opening in December 2021.

USCG Cutter Commissioned




The new Cutter in Philadelphia

The July 2021 Broadaxe , page 3, had a story that Todd Wardell had related to us about the upcoming commissioning of the USCG Emlen Tunnell. The Sentinel-class cutter, also known as Fast Response Cutter due to its program name, is part of the United States Coast Guard 's Deepwater program. She was commissioned in Friday, October 15, 2021 and **SMSNJ member John Bullock** was there.

Emlen Tunnell served in the United States Coast Guard from 1943 to 1946. He received the Silver Lifesaving Medal for heroism in rescuing a shipmate from flames during a torpedo attack in 1944 and rescuing another shipmate who fell into the sea in 1946. He next played 14 seasons in the National Football League (NFL) as a defensive halfback and safety for the New York Giants (1948 –1958) and Green Bay Packers (1959–1961). He was selected as a first team All -Pro six times and played in nine Pro Bowls. He was a member of NFL championship teams in 1956 and 1961. He held NFL career records for interceptions (79), interception return yards (1,282), punt returns (258), and punt return yards (2,209). He is in the ring of fame at Metife Stadium. The October 18, 2021 edition of the Star Ledger has a front page article by Jerry Izenberg; "Before become a Giant on the field, he was one in Wartime". It the story of how Emel Tunnell got into the NFL and was inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame.




Medway Longboat, English, 1742, 1:24


- Ryland Craze

(40 x 8 x 10 inches)



Mike says that he is about a year behind Chuck as he just can't keep up. (I'm not so sure ed.). He is about three and a half years into this build.




This week Mike finished the quarter-deck beams. The color of the hull is a bit different than Chuck's as it is in boxwood, and the reds are a bit darker than on Chuck's model. The fore-castle is the next up. He started this model in 1:64 but he stopped because the hull bulkheads warped. He now is, like Chuck, working with 1:48. When asked if he is going to rig it, he said that he would like to, but doesn't have the space. Mike has a build log on MSW. Beautiful work Mike.

Pride of Baltimore II, Privateer, USA

1812, 1:64, Model Shipways Kit



Rich is about a year into his first attempt to splice and cut planks. He has one of two belts from the wale down and will proceed to planking from the keel up. He will be planking a deck rather than using the scored decking supplied by the kit. To provide for a solid footing for the deck, he added balsa blocks between the bulkheads. Coming along nicely Rich.

Miss Seaside, Chris Craft Runabout USA

Bill took on this project Seaside Heights New Jersey is building an enclosure to enclose their carousel. The town administrator sent Bill a few black and white photographs and asked if he could build it. A member of the




Philadelphia SMS identified it as a Chris Craft. Chris Craft's plans and other documents are now in the Mariners Museum where Bill was able to purchase plans. The boat is a 1930 Chris Craft Tri Cockpit Runabout used by resort towns on the water to give speedboat rides. The ride had a princely cost of twenty five cents in the 1930s (now about \$125 in other seaside towns). Tom Ruggiero told Bill that this could be done very readily using the lift method to produce a hull. Various parts were made by 3-D printing by Shape ways with drawings made by Bill using Fusion 360. The steering wheel, steering post bracket, exhaust ports etc. were made by other SMSNJ members. The model is just about completed. This model also has a build log on MSW.

Hesper, Schooner, 1884,
USA, 1:64, Scratch Built

Hesper was a Boston pilot schooner built in 1884. Designed by Dennison Lawlor, Hesper was known for her speed. Rich is working with Eric Ronnberg plans and multiple photos of the schooner. The plans are excellent and are extremely detailed.

The deck is just about complete but he still has a bit more deck furniture and fittings to fabricate and install.


Rich just finished up coppering the hull using home made copper plates. To make them Rich gilded copper leaf onto acid free computer paper that was already gridded out. Then to indicate the nails I used a pounce wheel. Then they were cut out. The

thinness of the plates were probably close to scale and were very easy to glue on. The total cost of the coppering was under \$20. with enough left over to copper eight more models. Rich finds that these plates look more in scale than using copper foil tape. Very real looking Rich..


Constellation, 1857, USA,
Sloop of War, 1:64, Artesana Latina Kit

New member, Chris, brought in this model of the USS Constellation. It is a double planked model, plank on bulkhead. It outer planking is mahogany. He says that the model went together relatively easily. He keep most of the details in the kit and used copper tape for the hull.

Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit
(54 x 21 x 37 inches)

Mort completed and mounted all channels and chain plates on the hull. He is now installing the gun port lids - which he made from scratch for what I thought would be more realistic look- the rigols lanyards, eye bolts and scuttles - on the lower gun deck He plans to glue the scuttles onto a thin piece of styrene on the outside of the port and put a latch on the inside for more realism. On the ports that intercept the wales I glued wood on each port to match the wales between each gun port hinge. The middle gun deck lids are installed and he is now working on the lower gun deck.
