Ed. Notes:

One of the benefits of belonging to a club is that you gain access to the resources of the collective group. In the SMSNJ, we are very lucky have a group of ship modelers with a broad range of skill sets and interests. Everyone, regardless of your level has something to offer the collective group. If you have an idea or would be interested in conducting a tech session please contact Chuck.

Some possible future tech session topics:

- Possible new tech sessions
 - Scarf Joint making An introductory presentation describing what a Scarf Joint is, and a hands-on session for the entire group so that each member could make a joint
 - Ship Model Kit Deficiencies How to overcome the shortcomings of some commercially available Ship Model kits
 - Ship Model Customization How to customize Ship Model kits with either scratch built or secondary market items [i.e. Blocks, etc.]
 - Ship's Plans A description of the different types of Ship's Plans and an instruction on how to properly read and visualize the plans
 - Cross Sled How to create a cross cut sled for your table saw.
 - Spray Painting Use and care of spray painting equipment
 - Photo Etched Items: How to properly bend and work with photo etched items
 - Adding Patina to armament
- Possible Repeat of some successful past tech sessions
 - Painting a Frieze Hands on tech session for the entire group on Painting a Frieze
 - Soldering [Silver and Resistance Soldering]

- Photo Etching how to create your own photo etched items
- Trunnels what are trunnels, how they are created and used on a model ship

The topics listed above are but a sampling of the range of possible topics. You will find that the group is wide open to possibilities. Please, don't be shy.

The SMSNJ is very lucky in that one of our members, Chuck Passaro is not only a supremely talented ship modeler, but is also a professional model designer as well. In 2012 our club hosted the Joint Conference, in CT and we enlisted Chuck as the featured speaker. He gave a fantastic presentation that both described his approach to the Ship Model design process, as well as presented his thoughts on the state of the existing ship models that are currently available. I don't know if Chuck is open to re-visiting the presentation, but I believe that this would be a very positive presentation for the entire club's membership.

TOOL TIME

Jim Brynes Table Saw maintenance tips: for the club members that currently own or are thinking of getting a Jim Brynes Table Saw, it is strongly recommended that you periodically turn the saw onto its side and vacuum out any saw dust that might have accumulated on the inside of the saw. It is also recommend that you periodically clean and lubricate the knuckle joint that is responsible for the blade height adjustment.

He bought and downloaded the paper templates for his model from the website called "War Artisans Workshop". The model is built by gluing the preprinted color paper around a balsa or card stock hull, adding wood and wire masts and rigging made of stiffened thread. Dan mounted his model on a carved and painted base. Dan found the flags online, downloaded them into his computer, adjusted their size and printed them.


WHITE ELEPHANT SALE




