DECEMBER 16 MEETING


In attendance: 25 members, 1 guest: Frank Summers from Basking Ridge. This is Frank's first visit. John Maughan attended his third meeting as a guest and was unanimously voted in as a new member. Welcome John!

SETTING THE RECORD STRAIGHT

I realize this is a major stretch for many of us, but think back to 5th grade history, to what Mr./Mrs./Miss/ Sister _____ taught us about the first steamboat. Robert Fulton and *Clermont*, right? Actually, no. That




honor belongs to John Fitch (1743-1798), an American inventor and engineer. Fitch dabbled in a variety of careers as a gunsmith, clockmaker, surveyor and supplier to the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War. He is best known, though, for development of the first commercially viable steamboat. Fitch based his propulsion unit on <u>James Watt's</u> steam engine, developed in the late 1770's in Scotland. Unable to secure an original Watt engine because Britain forbade export of technology to its former colony, he created his own with the help of <u>Henry Voigt</u>, a Philadelphia clockmaker. When finally placed aboard a specially designed vessel, the Fitch/Voigt engine was located amidships and linked to a bank of oars mounted to



starboard and port. It was a primitive design, but it worked. Fitch and Voigt worked on improvements over the next few years, and in June 1790, launched a 60-foot boat propelled by several stern

mounted oars, operating much like a swimming duck's feet. This boat carried up to 30 passengers and traveled between Philadelphia and Burlington, New Jersey. Fitch applied for a patent for his invention and was awarded




one on August 26, 1791. Unfortunately, the patent only covered the boat design, not its engine, and the patent office awarded 3 other patents the same day for competitive steam engine designs. The loss of a monopoly on the steam engine caused some of Fitch's investors to back out, and he was left without the financial resources to carry on. And what of Fulton? In all fairness, he was the man who made commercial steamboat travel a reality on a grand scale. Largely due to his efforts, the steamboat was a major factor in the success of the American industrial revolution. It facilitated the rapid transport of raw materials and finished goods, and opened up the country's interior to exploration and settlement.

One of the more interesting contacts made was with the <u>Sea Scouts</u>, an organization keen on doing something jointly with our club.
