#### **TECH SESSION**

Tonight's Technical session was a demonstration of weathering Techniques by Mason Loggie. Mason had several models that he was in the process of weathering. The key is to study photographs of various craft at various stages of their like to understand how those various steaks and smudges and just overall dirt and grime form. A particularly good tool for applying the various weathering powders and washes is actually very available and inexpensive. Mason makes use of soft tip eye applicators. They come 12 to the package and can be obtained in the makeup aisle at any pharmacy. The following are materials list some of the many medium that can be used for weathering:

All of these can be obtained online, from Micro Mark, or from your local hobby store.

Len has done quite a bit of weathering himself. He uses nail media. They are pointed as q tips. He obtained pastels that work very well. These are marked for model work, but we think that artists chalk may work as well. The pastels stick well on flat paint. If you make a mistake a damp Q-tip clears it off. Len also uses dry brushing to weather as well.



Another HMS Victory was shown by Mort Stoll. Mort started with the Caldercraft kit of Nelson's flag ship. He has coopered the hull. He has upgraded the quarter gallery with seat of ease and lanterns. He replaced the gratings with Syren Ship model gratings. He has added shot garlands and is installing cannons.

Tom Ruggiero continues to make progress on HMS Liverpool. He has crossed the main topgallant yard and has set the main topgallant sail and the jib. There will be one more sail set; the fore topgallant, and one more furled; the mizzen topgallant. More rigging going on. Top uses small clothes pins as weights to get the line to hang correctly (see some in the photos). After finishing the sails, on adding a rail to the midships and ships boats. The finish line is in sight!

Serving a Rope

New member Joshua how a remarkably interesting Shop Note. He is currently rigging his model and served rope is called for. He has the Serve o Matic from Syren Ship Model Company, but he went with the Tim Allen approach (Tool Time!). Serving was used to prevent chaffing of standing rigging. It was a one of a three-part process called worming (putting another strand into the weave of the rope), serving (wrapping a smaller strand around the whole rope) and parceling (wrapping a leather cover over the serving).

Joshua mounted a reversing drill on his bench and uses it to power the machine (although warned by Chuck that the Server was not designed to operate at such speeds). He uses 100 weight thread and makes one wrap around his finger to get the right tension. Nevertheless, the served line looks excellent. He notes that if you have overlapped the serving line, you simply reverse the drill. The served line looks great. Usual disclaimers: your mileage may vary.

Barry asked Josh about his shop light. It is an industrial LED lamp that he mounted on his ceiling. It costs about \$150. Google "Dock Lights". Contact Josh for more information.
