He also showed earlier projects the Rattlesnake and Half Mon. Beautiful work. Doc Fletcher suggested that he needed to get the models in cases. Felipe has three cats and one of them knocked over his model of Prince de Neufchatel. His current project is the Scottish Maid,

Tech Session

"Jahn's Hobby Shop"

Tonight's presentation was given by Fred Hutchinson of Jan's Hobby Shop. 1435 Lexington Avenue (94th street), New York, New York 10128 and it is strictly a brick and mortar operation (no website). Their phone number is (212) 987-4765. They have been in business in 50 years. The shop is run by he and his mother, Collette. He has enjoyed every moment in the shop. Open 10 to 6:30 Monday through Saturday and 12 to 5 on Sunday. There is an extensive stock of paints, glues and other finishing supplies. They also carry and extensive supply of plastic and wood stock.

He built a Ticonderoga Class Cruiser in 1:96, with George W. Bush and Laura Bush. There is a fully operational Type VII-C U-Boat in 1:72. There is a model of the Weeks Marine Floating Crane that was used to retrieve the US Air plane that Sully Sullenberger landed in the Hudson River. A scratch built Gato Class submarine in 1:48. He also has built several seaplanes, all scratch built. His best piece is the Blum Vos 238. Only three were built and it had retractable floats in the wings. As will all his models, scratch built. He is planning on making videos of his modeling techniques and, even when he retires, continue to be an avid model builder. He is also going to make a DVD of his aircraft collections.

Online, if you Google Jan's Hobby Shop, you will be able to read an excellent article by Corey Kilgannon in the NY Times, written on May 27, 2016. The article describes the shop very well, but also talks about Fred's mother Collette who is an artist and opens the shop ever morning.

From NYMag.com:

"At Jan's in Yorkville, kit packages and fittings for miniature model boats, pocket-size planes, small soldiers, and the like are stacked floor-to-ceiling, waiting for the next pair of hands to come along and bring them to small-scale life. Manager Fred Hutchins's own obsession started at the age of 5 with plastic kits from Woolworth's. By the time he was a teenager, he noticed a for sale sign in a York Avenue hobby-shop window and persuaded his folks to buy the store. That was 1973. Today, the shop, which moved in 2003 to a bigger space on Lexington Avenue, attracts hobbyists and parents eager to tear their children away from the television. Many even arrange with Hutchins to have model-building birthday parties for up to 10 kids in the store's dusty dungeon (his only rule: no food). Hutchins and his mom, Collette, are happy to share their architectural secrets. Or catch him on alternate Sunday mornings and some week days at the 72nd Street Model Boat Pond in Central Park, where he sails his remote-control ships for all to see. "

Steve Fletcher has completed his Kyak in a olive oil cruet.



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Kate Cory, Whaler, 1806, 1:64 Scale

This is Rich's first completed ship.

Originally built as a fore and aft schooner, she made two voyages. She was converted to a brig in 1858 and retained this rig until 1863, when she was captured and burned by the CSS Alabama off the coast of Buenos Aries. A few odd notes about her.

Her royal sail and yard were removed when hunting whales, since thee fore crosstree was used as a lookout. The royal yard was used only on trips to and from the fishing grounds.


Her whaleboats did not have center boards. Ronnberg makes this point clear in the plans and the rigging spec booklet.

3. She didn't use iron hoops for the lookouts. There was merely a rope used for a handrail lashed from the upper shrouds and around the mast.




The model was started back in 1989. A vintage Model Shipways kit. Rich completed the hull's topsides, bulwarks and deck planking when the model went into deep storage until late 2016 after his children had grown and he found myself with some free time. Almost a year was taken away from it while he built Chuck's Medway longboat, and completed the Kate Cory Jan, 2021. The case was purchased from a web site called



grandpascabinets.com. Nothing fancy, but he will make a case to any specs, ships with the plexiglass, and assembles real easy. I thought the price was fairly reasonable considering what I've seen for some cases that ship minus glass or plexiglass. He also has great one on one customer service with fast replies to answer any questions or concerns. I ordered and had my case in 3 weeks. end is close but there's still a lot of things that need

Kingfisher, Bristol Pilot Cutter 1:8

Michael is a guest who comes to us by way of Model Ship World (MSW). Tonight he presented his model of this beautiful cutter. It is entirely scratch built and it was started in 2012.

From the build log on MSW; "This pilot cutter is based on some plans that were published by MAP (Model and Allied Press) back in the early 70's and those plans were actually based on the fishing smack CK482. The model is LOD 63 inches, LOA 84 inches, Beam 18 inches Draft 10 1/2 inches. He intends to sail this model.

Michael presented several of the items that he is currently fabricating. The wonderfully incredible thing here is that all of these items function. For example, the binnacle has operating compasses. All of the rigging is functional.

The cabin door has a door knob and latching mechanism that function just

like the 1:1 version. This model is astounding! Thank you very much for showing this at our meeting. For more photos (thousands) and information, there is a fully detailed build log on MSW. The build log also shows how the parts were fabricated. You will enjoy it, I'm certain.


21ft English Pinnace, Pinnace, English, 1:48 Scale

This is Eric's first plank on frame model. The model is an amalgamation based on a number of similar boats found at the National Maritime Museum in Greenwich. For Eric, this is his first stab at planking a hull and thought I would start with a small project before I start my 1:12 'HMS Victory towing the Wasa and the USS Constitution ' diorama. :) The learning curve for planking an open boat is very steep. Eric's model is based on the kit designed by Chuck Passaro with a fw modifications and enhancements. Eric has a build log ofn MSW with more details about his project. Looking very good Eric.


This model was built by Mike's Father in law's great grandfather, Lenox Stewart Faber 1861-1933). The plans are from 1902, so figure the model was built around then. He lived in East Orange (a local boy!) and evidently built 2 versions of this: one for the US Senate and one for himself. There are no additional details that we know of with regard to the Senate model. This model was built in 1902. He thinks that the rigging is wire but he is afraid to take the case off. He is thinking of



framing one of the blueprint sheets - not sure if that's a good idea or not. Curious what others think. A very interesting model Mike.







Medway Longboat, English, 1742, 1:24

Tom continues to make progress on his current project. He noted that he will not be masting or rigging it since, at 1:24, it is a very large model. However, all the details that would be there for setting up the rig are included. He has installed all of the iron work (fabricated in brass) for the mast, bowsprit, and horse. He also included ring bolts fin the bow, stern, and floor boards that would be used to lift the boat and for attachment of the anchoring cable. It is getting close to completion.

Mort has completed the Captains cabin, day cabin,. Dining cabin furniture, next come the bulkheads. He is now working on the Forecastle bulkheads. He will then be moving to the quarterdeck and installing the fabricating and installing the helm and binnacle. Mort is very happy with the kit and that it allows you to add a lot of detail. Beautiful Mort.













HMS Victory, English 1st Rate, Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit




He still has to build the side serving tables and the fore and aft bulkheads furniture for his day cabin - dresser, chest and a desk.


All of the quarterdeck cannons are mounted and rigged.

Very well done, Mort!










Providence, Colonial Schooner, 1776, 1:48 Scale - Ken Whitehead

Ken. Is working on the stern of the ship. The color of the ship is based on an English report that it was black. However, Ken has found documentation of John Paul Jones scraping the ships bottom and this contemporary painting shows the ships sides as bright.








Zip Along 2, Run-about, USA, 1:12

As mentioned before, Seaside Heights is building a museum to house their carousel. The asked for a model of this boat to display in the museum. Miss Seaside was a boat that gave speedboat rides to tourists visiting the NJ shore town of Seaside Heights. I was able to get the plans from the Mariners Museum in Newport News Va. She is a 1930 26' Chris Craft Tri-Cabin Run-About. The model will be entirely scratch built.

The plans had to be redrafted for 1/2" lifts which were purchased and cut to plan. The 8 lifts were glued together and then faired with chisel, rasp and finally sander. Bow stem added. Bill commented that using the lift method allows you to have a solid hull relatively quickly. He has planked the poplar hull with cherry veneer that will be stained with mahogany. Shaping up nicely Bill.
