Meeting Report: The virtual meeting was called to order by President Bill Brown at 1900 on Tuesday, December 23, 2020. There were sixteen members and nine guests. Joe Jorden is from the Philadelphia Ship Model Society. We even had Kevin Kenny, who joined in from Tobago. Welcome to you all.

The Treasurer reported of transactions for the month and the balance in the SMSNJ bank account.

As has become a standard for our virtual meetings, President Bill has us touring the members workshops to check on their current project. Here are a few of the current projects.

Gene Berger from the Hampton Roads Club is working on a 1:48 scale Destroyer Escort. He is incorporating incredible detail to tjer model. He does his own photoetching as well as making the drawings, and is making extensive use of 3 D printing. For example, on the 5" mounts will have a fully detailed interior. He uses brass in seceral places (like gun tubs) due to structural considerations. Gene's workmanship is something to behold.

Eric Marshall continues working on the Model Expo Pinnace. This is Eric's first attempt at planking so he is on a very steep learning curve as an open boat is particularly challenging to plank.

Joe Jordan of the Philadelphia Ship Model Society (PSMS) says that the rotunda exhibit at the Philadelphia Independence Seaport was a huge success. He showed an inherited model of the Sequin. It is the 39" version. It is one of fourteen models that were bequeathed to the PSMS. He is offering a completed model of the Morgan, free to a good home. Contact Joe.

Virtual Tour



The last one that Tom took was in commemoration of the fire on board the aircraft carrier USS Constellation that was building in the Brooklyn Navy yard. The fire occurred on December 19, 1960. Many are of the opinion that it was a reason for the Navy to stop building ships in Brooklyn, but it could also be because the ships could not fit under the Brooklyn Bridge with any masts installed. Tom's uncle worked for the Navy and was at the Navy Yard during the fire.

"Rebuilding the Charles W. Morgan"

Ryland Craze presented a video of the extensive rebuild of the Charles W. Morgan for it's cruise up and down the east coast in 2014. The video was prepared by Mystic Seaport. A good amount of frames and planking needed to be replaced and the ship was completely re-rigged. Since the ship was going to carry passengers for the cruise there needed to be several upgrades to fire protection and navigation equipment.

The required modifications were made with very little disturbance of the general impression of the whaler. Thank you Ryland.





VOC Retourschip Restoration



Dan is continuing with the restoration of this contemporary model. The ships name is not known, but by researching other ships plans he has been able to identify the type and size of the ship and narrowed it down to the prototype being built between 1714 and 1730.

At this point, Dan has removed and cleaned the interior of the models hull. He is now repairing broken and displaced frames.









He explained that there were three different types of frames in the model as the photographs show. He als found a what appears to be a buider's mark. Unfortunately, it cannot be identified. Great work, Dan.









Leon, Brigantine, Norway, 1:48

The Leon was built in 1880, carried coal and lumber and maybe other stuff, land was lost to excessive leaking 1917. Doug has used Plans from Underhill and extra research by a friend in Norway. The model is mostly scratch built, plank on frame.

Since we last saw the model, the hull is finished, the spars are well underway and the standing rigging is just about to be started. Doug stated that he is having a lot of fun with this project.

Very impressive and coming along very nicely.





HMS Liverpool, English 6th Rate, 1776, 1:96 Scale


Except for painting five figures, the Liverpool is finally complete! It has been a very long time coming.





The final steps were to add three boats (a pinnace, a launch, and a jolly boat), add a Red Ensign, a commissioning flag on the staff on the bowsprit cap, and a blue pennant on the main topgalant truck. The flags were made using Chuck's method of printing them out on tissue and the over spraying with matt finish.

The acrylic cover was fabricated by "Every Thing—Plastic" on North 2nd Street in Philadelphia. While there are less expensive online places to get the cover, they all had very large tolerances. I was able to bring the base frame to the establishment and they matched the case to the frame exactly. Thank you to the PSMS for the very good advice. While I did other models iwhile Liverpool was building, it did take a very long time. The hull blanks for this model were cut out in 1995!




Medway Longboat, English, 1742, 1:24

My next project is to finish the Long Boat that I had begun when SMSNJ was doing their group build. I will not be masting or rigging the boat as it would make it too large to display. Nevertheless, I will be adding all of the attachment point for the rigging, mast and bowsprit irons. The photos show progress to this point.





Providence, Colonial Schooner, 1776, 1:48 Scale - Ken Whitehead

Since last time, Ken made a ship's boat using the technique from Tom'sTech Session.

He made a rudder from holly. Using the Syren kit for the pintles and gudgeons (rudder hinges). The shaft is extra long and will be shortened once the quarter deck is made.

Last, Ken finished rigging the guns on the Providence's hull as well as adding the channels, more belaying pin racks and made the belaying pins for those racks.

Looking very good, Ken.









HMS Victory, English 1st Rate, Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit



The master's cabin includes a hammock, desk, chair and 2 clothing trunks. it's only missing the after bulkhead. For now the captains dining cabin only has a large table and chairs which look much better in person than in the pictures.

Very well done, Mort!











Bluenose II, Billings Boats Kit






Medway Longboat, English, 1742, 1:24

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
