


# Tech Session

## ""Researching and Gathering Data for the Schooner, Alice S. Wentworth " Tom Lauria

Tom Lauria provided a video on how to make moldings. The video was excellent. An advantage of virtual meetings is that we can have guests that would not be able to be at a meeting. Tonight, Tom Lauria is here to present the research that he did for his model of the Alice S. Wentworth.

He talked about how he selects subjects for his models. Some people enjoy doing the research. Tom selects his subjects are those ships that he is drawn to. The Alice S. Wentworth heard the name of the ship at a museum reception. He found a go deal of material for the ship and those who operated her. He talked about her master, Zeb Tilton



The Alice S. Wentworth was original named the Lizzie A. Tolles in 1863, in



South Norwalk, Connecticut. Lizzie A. Tolles served mostly from Connecticut to ports along the Hudson river. In 1891 she was purchased by the Stevens Brothers, Arthur and Charles of Welles, Maine. In 1904 the ship went through an extensive rebuild. The Stevens brothers renamed her Alice S. Wentworth (their favorite niece). In 1921 Zeb Tilton of Martha's Vineyard purchases her Alice S. Wentworth and sailed her for the next twenty two years. In 1943, she was purchased by Captain Parker Hull of Maine. She was used in the as windjammer until 1962. She was purchased by Anthony Athanas (Antony's Pier 4 Restaurants) for conversion to a restaurant in 1965 but sank at the dock in Boston next to the restaurant. She was finally broken apart in a winter storm in 1974. The Wentworth was a center board schooner that drew only 5 feet of water with the board up and another 7 feet with the board down. Tom dis-

cussed other characteristics of the ship and it's very tall rig. With such tall masts, she only had two shrouds per side. Tom described the very colorful and interesting life of Zeb Tilton and the Wentworth.

Tom found a plans and measurements for the schooner but there was a good amount of conflicting information. He settled on stretching the plans that he found in Mystic although there were some discrepancies that he needed to sort. Tom then did a review of the features of his model. He noted that nothing is too neat, because it is a work boat.

Thank you Tom for a great presentation.

Inside his 1:8 model, Michael installed a smaller version inside the cabin of the larger model. Fantastic work Michael.






# HMS Victory, English 1st Rate, Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit (54 x 21 x 37 inches)








# Providence, Colonial Schooner, 1776, 1:48 Scale - Ken Whitehead
