Tech Session

"The Model Collection at the Hudson River Maritime Museum"



Tonight's presentation was given by Mark Peckham. Mark grew up near Albany NY, and now lives on the Hudson River in the historic shipbuilding town of New Baltimore. He has been interested in historic ships and boats since childhood. He retired from a long career in historic preservation where among many roles he had the opportunity to help preserve and document historic ships and shipwrecks. He currently volunteers as a trustee at the Hudson River Maritime Museum in Kingston, NY. Mark has given up scuba diving but still enjoys boating, sailing, and painting. He restores old ship models and carves new ones outdoors, especially at the beach.





Tech Session

"The Model Collection at the Hudson River Maritime Museum" cont'd

The museum is located on the water in Kingston, New York. They have a campus with an historic tug boat, amuseum building with their archievs and collections as well as a boat building center. The museum was established in 1979 by a group that had previously tried to save the Dayline Steamer Alexander Hamilton. That did not come to pass but they were determined to create an institution to commemorate and preserve the steam boating iand tug boating industry on the Hudson River. The mission has been expanded






to cover all things maritime on the Hudson River and its tributaries.. They have built at the museum the first completely solar powered passenger boat.

The model collection can be divided into five categories. These are; Antique Scale Models, Professional Scale Models, Folk Models, Toys and Pond Models, and Miniatures. Mark also introduced several of the on staff volunteers that maintain and repair the collection.




HMS Victory, English 1st Rate, Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit (54 x 21 x 37 inches)









HMS Victory, English 1st Rate, Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit (cont'd)






Gothic, White Star Liner, 1893; Scale 1:600

The White Star Liner GOTHIC was built in 1893 for the New Zealand service of the company in conjunction with the Shaw, Saville and Albion line. The GOTHIC was 490.7' bp and 7755 gross tons. She was the first twin screw ship to trade with New Zealand and the fastest ship in the service. The model is to the scale of 1:600 (1"=50'). The plans came from her builders, Harland & Wolff, in Belfast, Northern Ireland. As it turns out, the plans show the ship as rebuilt for service in the Red Star line from Antwerp to New York. I needed to do a lot of photo research to



ting tired of making railings, I am using the ones from Tom's Modelworks. I made the flags from glassineprinted sheets by copying the flags from the internet. I have already carved and painted the water and built






find out how she originally looked when built.

The hull is carved from basswood and the decks are holly. The masts are turned from shish kabob skewers and the cargo booms are brass. The deckhouses are bass with paper overlays. The lifeboats are carved from balsa and coated with 2 or 3 layers of diluted wood filler. Since I am get-






Medway Longboat, English, 1742, 1:24

Tom is finished with his long boat except for the windlass bars, grapple, oars, and a method to display it. Tom has included all of the fixtures that would be needed to rig the boat such as the chains for the shrouds and the block and horse for the boom sheet. He explained that he isn't rigging the boat as there is no space left to display it with the mast aand bowsprit shipped. Now on to the next project which will be repairing and cleaning some of his older models.









Lobster Boat, US, Bluejacket Kit 5/8" - 1'


Yankee Hero - BlueJacket Shipcrafters - 3/8"=1' - 1889 Quoddy Boat
