A Significant Discovery

Rich Verost sent me the following link to the story in the Wall Street Journal.

Ernest Shackleton's ship the Endurance has been found in the Antarctic. The expedition was to reach the South Pole. Endurance became trapped in the ice and was eventually crushed and sank. The crew was able to make their was dragging there boats overland, and from there to uninhabited Elephant Island. Shackleton and a portion of his crew were able to cross over violent seas to reach a whaling port. From

there he was able to gather up the remaining crew and then sail to Argentina. The mission did not achieve its goal, but the entire crew survived.

The Endurance was found within 4 miles of its last recorded position. Due to the frigid water the wreck is upright and is in very good condition. It will be left undisturbed.



Technical Session

"Copper Plating with Copper Leaf By: Rich Lane

Coppering the hull of a model has been done in several ways. Tonight Rich Lane demonstrated his method for making and installing copper plate. You will need a book of Copper Leaf (about 25 sheets, Gilding Size (water based adhesive), a Soft Flat Artist's Bruise, Pounce wheels, and Acid Free paper (Rich used 20 lb). You will also want acrylic iridescent copper paint. A source for supplies is Gerry's Artarama, (https://www.jerrysartarama.com/, 800 827-8478).

First, you need to decide what size plates you will need and the correct scale dimension. Using that information, make a grid on the paper. You will need to make enough copies for all of the plates that you will need. After you've made the grid, turn the paper over. On the plane



side apply the gilding size using the soft brush. The size will set in about 30 minutes and it will be tacky, like sticky masking tape but it should not be sticky or wet. The size will stay tacky for up to eight hours so there is plenty of time for



you to work. The leaf is actual copper. Spread the copper on the tacky size and smooth it with a soft rag. Even if it tears a bit, you can readily smooth it back and add other pieces. If you miss a spot, simply add some size, let it cure, and add more leaf.

After an short period of time, turn the paper over on a firm suffice (a magazine works) so that the grid is face up. Next the nails that fix the plates to the hull are simulated using pounce wheels. Use the wheels with the appropriate spacing. A metal ruler or other straight edge is a good guide. Be sure to use a light touch so that you don't punch a hole in the copper. (Tom noted that the

nails are actually flat headed and they sit in a dimple in the plate.) Now, cut out the plates using a sharp

blade or scissors. The plates are attached using wood glue or white glue. That gives you time to position the plates. Depending on the scale, it likely will not be necessary to overlap the plates. Rich noted that the paper edge of the laid plates may need to be touched up. For this, he paints the laid out plate edge with copper paint and then immediately wipes it off noting that you don't want the plates themselves painted, only the exposed edge. Rich let his copper weather for about four weeks. Once it got to the degree that he wanted he sprayed the hull with flat laquer spray. Thank you Rich. To see the result, see the Rich's model of Hesper.





Hesper, Schooner, 1884, USA, 1:64, Scratch Built

Hesper was a Boston pilot schooner built in 1884. Designed by Dennison Lawlor, Hesper was known for her speed. Rich is working with Eric Ronnberg plans and multiple photos of the schooner. The plans are excellent and are extremely detailed. The photos show the excellent affect that the is achieved with the coppering that Rich demonstrated at this meeting.





Medway Longboat, 1750, English, 1:24, Syren Shipmodel Kit

Tom brought in his completed model of the Medway Longboat. Tom chose to not mast and rig his model. Rather, Tom displays his model as it would be lashed down on HMS Medway. This model is a very large scale (1:24). Tom notes that at that scale many of the representations of various lashings that you can use at smaller scales would not be acceptable. So, using various references including "Ashley's Book of Knots" Tom did actual lashings, fisherman's bends, and anchor bends where appropriate. He also added the various ring bolts that would be needed to lift the boat.







Freebooters Last Leg, 1700, English, 1:12, Lindberg Kit

Mason does diorama for various shows and events. This Caribbean Pirate is one on the models that Mason will put in his display. The model is plastic with a few animated features such as the swinging arm with the sword. Mason will be completing the weathering. There will be three other models in the diorama including "Hex Marks the Spot". He has used this model as an experiment to hone his skills.







Deck Cannon Diorama, English 18th Century, 1:24, Model Shipways Kit

Mike had this kit for a some time and he decided to just do it. He also has the carronade that he also plans to do. He mentioned that this is the first model that he has done that has a cannon. It was mentioned that that is a bit atypical as most just love to build anything with a cannon. He learned several techniques including holystoning the deck. He says that his daughter needed to help him out with some of the links of the ring bolts. The model was built in a month of weekends. Carronade coming soon Mike?

Acrylic Case

Mike recently completed a model of Yankee Hero and needed a case. The case that he found is made by Acrylicjob.com. They will make a case to your measurements. You can order many thicknesses of acrylic and either a wood or hard acrylic base. I ordered a 20"L x 8"W

x 18'H case with 3/16" acrylic thickness. The price was pretty reasonable - \$172.96 plus \$28 shipping and \$11.42 in tax. Total was \$212.75. It was noted that other available custom cases are almost double the cost.

The case comes packed flat and it is very easy to assemble. The corners are held in place with tabs. From two feet away you really don't notice the corner tabs. I ordered the case \$3/4" higher than I would have because I am making a teak base for the boat to sit on. He was planning on building a case from scratch, but as my wife reminded me, I have a lot going on.











HMS Victory, English 1st Rate, Scale 1:72, Modified Caldercraft Kit (54 x 21 x 37 inches)
