Technical Session

"Miniature World, Staten Island" by Bill Woodward

Bill Woodward of Miniature World, formerly Gulliver's Gate. They were open from May 2017 to January 2020. They had second floor of the former New York Times Building (45,000 square feet) in Times Square. It was a privately owned with eight galleries. Each Gallery was a area of the world. Each model was between 700 and 1,300 square feet. The different areas of the model were literally built all over the world. Manhattan was built in Brooklyn. The New England model was built by Steven Lamb in Massachusetts. Europe and the UK was built in Italy. Russia was built in St Petersburg. Asia was built in Beijing. Latin America was built in Buenos Aries by a family and fifty other people. Because of the high quality, that



family was hired to build of portion of Miniature Wonderland in Hamburg, Germany. There was a model of the Middle East built in Jerusalem. There was a model of an airport complete with taxing and landing planes. Some of the models include liquid waterways with moving ships including and operating model of the Panama

Canal.



The exhibit was forced to close due to the extremely high rent. In October 2019, they were faced with closing the exhibit and moving it. In February 2020 they were approached by the Empire Outlets Mall in Staten Island. They were offered the entire top floor of the mall (20,000 square feet) with an amazing view of the city.

For the move they needed to break down the exhibit to ship it to Staten Island. In March, 2020 they needed to stop due to Covid. They then needed to wait an additional one and a half years because they were locked out because they had been forced to break the original thirty year lease. After a court settlement, they were able to move the models over ten nights with fifty trucks.

They are using a empty store in the mall to do the architectural modeling and improve the buildings on the model of Manhattan. Most of the assets are in a parking garage that was provided. Since the new space is smaller and configured differently, most of the models need to be rebuilt, at least in part. The Manhattan model is now split so that you can walk through the model. Additionally, there are water features of both the Hudson and East River as well as the Upper Bay. There are HO Ships that move through the water features and there is an underwater drive feature to move them. The water feature is sixteen inches wide and one hundred feet long with five drive loops to move the boats. One of these animations will be a Fireboat responding to an emergency. There will be water pools with dyed water so the bottom isn't visible. All of this will be HO scale. The Latin America model includes and operating Panama Canal with a 36" long Container Ship. The owner wants as much movement as possible on this model. Bill believes that even though it is a smaller exhibit it is a much better exhibit including rural England and the Netherlands including water canals and the Thames.

Ryland who has been to Gulliver's Gate was able to show photographs from when he viewed it. One upgrade that Bill noted is that, due to cost, the upper floors of the buildings in Manhattan were simulated with lighted plexiglass boxes. It the new exhibit, these will be replaced with fully detailed models.

A very good looking exhibit that we will all enjoy. Thank you Bill.



Mort has been making the ship's boat for HMS Victory. All of these boats are plank on frame. Launch and cutter are complete with oars, anchors, baling pail, and tillers attached. He is waiting for Vice Admiral and Captain's flag's to arrive for the barge and pinnace before completing them. The launch also had a winch and a davit for raising the anchor buoy.

Making the boats is a bit of a filler as he takes a break from rigging the ship. Currently he is rigging the Main Mast.

Steady progress Mort.










Bark, Canada? Late 19th Century Scratch Reconstruction, Scale 1:96?




IJN Mugami, 1942
