His work was just fixing the busted spars and other woodwork. Replacing the damaged and missing rigging and re-gluing the copper sheets and making a couple dozen missing plates (and coloring them to match the unusual coloring the builder decided on.) Ethan is continuing his restoration. He has finished the masts and is now rigging shrouds of the main mast. He is having issues getting consistency for each shroud. Mort suggested a jig for spacing the deadeyes. Ethan has started to rig the shrouds on the mainmast first. Kevin suggested that he should rig bowsprit, fore, main mizzen as all the tenshion comes from the bowsprit. Tom mentioned that he rigs from the mizzen mast forward because of the limited space between main and mizzen, He noted that in any case, he leaves the deadeye lanyards loose for as long as possible so that adjustments can be made latter. Also, as mentioned by Josh, the shrouds can be left loose until the running rigging is set up as once the shrouds are tied and ratlines installed it is very tough to do the running rigging between the masts.

Good progress Ethan.





RMS Carpathia

Cunard Line Passenger Liner

1903; Scale 1:600, Scratch

In April 1912, the Carpathia rescued survivors of the rival White Star Line's RMS Titanic after it struck an iceberg and sank in the North Atlantic Ocean. The Carpathia navigated the ice fields to arrive two hours after the Titanic had sunk, and the crew rescued 705 survivors from the ship's lifeboats.



Bod has finished the decks and most of the deck gear. He has finished fabricating the masts and booms. Next will be the ventilators. On the largest he turned the cowl on a lathe. The smallest ones are stretched plastic tubing. The medium ones are made with a beaders crimp fitting. Very nice, Bob.









Veritas Wheel Marking Gage and Luthiers bronze marking gauge for circular work

Eric brought in two different marking gages. The first is available from Veritas. As described on their website; There are two main problems with a typical marking gauge: you have to tilt it just right to avoid pin chatter and, even then, the pin tends to follow the wood grain, throwing off your line. Our wheel marking gauge solves both problems.

The hardened steel wheel cutter scribes perfectly at any point of its circumference. Since it cuts wood fibers rather than tears, it marks cleanly, even on cross grain.

The second is the Luthiers marking gage. The interesting feature here is that this gage can be used as a duplicar to transfer from one piece to another.



The tools are about \$30 each.
