The club has been asked to do a model exhibit at Fairleigh Dickinson University. **Nick** is talking to the FDU representative.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING, JANUARY 22, 2002

President Nick Starace called the meeting to order at 7:37 PM. Thirty-three members and four guests were in attendance. Our guests were **Dave Sasher** of Lake Hopatcong, **Ken Davis** of Hillsdale, and **Paul Whelan** of Ridgewood. Fourth time guest **Ernest Connor** was unanimously accepted to membership. Welcome aboard **Ernest**!

Ken Schuetz reported that our Morris County Library exhibit was a rousing success. **Nick Starace** stated that a Fairleigh Dickinson University Show on a smaller scale is still being investigated.

Our scheduled speaker, Scott Kodger, Director of Curatorial Affairs, at the USS New Jersey Battleship Museum in Camden had to cancel at the last minute. He plans to speak at our next meeting on February 26.

To fill the breech, **Len Schwalm** shared with us a 20 minute video tape that he had made on our cruise on the *Richard Robbins* October 21, 2001. Also on the tape was a survey of our model exhibit at the Morris County Library.

SHOW AND TELL

Henry Schaefer is scratch building *City of Naples*, a cargo-passenger vessel 1:100 scale. **Ken Schuetz** showed his nearly completed 1928 Mississippi River sternwheeler towboat *Wild Goose*. **Don Otis**

showed two Sultana's and a Benjamin Latham, all of which he is building simultaneously. Steve Fletcher has framed and partially planked Carondolet, an ironclad Mississippi River gunboat from the Civil War. John Marinovich presented a 5" long bottle with a catboat, two people and the Barnegat light all inside. Henry Schaefer is scratch building City of Naples, a cargo-passenger vessel 1:100 scale. Ken Schuetz showed his nearly completed 1928 Mississippi River sternwheeler towboat Wild Goose. Gary Kingzett is progressing nicely with BB16, the first USS New Jersey. Arch Griffith showed Tuggy Tooter, a ceramic caricature of a tugboat, as well as two "chairs in bottles" made by a former shipmate of Roy Goroski's Emma C. Berry has its Arch's. interior completed. Bob Fivehouse showed his 1:200 White Star liner Republic, noting that the exploration of this ship's wreckage is a current news story.

NEW BUSINESS

Dave Watkins has agreed to issue an abbreviated version of the *Broadaxe* for the next month or so. He will also try to issue a version via e-mail and on our web site. Bob Brehm will locate the club's archives and see whether portions are suitable for the club's web site. Bring-a-Model night will at our March meeting. Barry Rudd will present the April Tech Session.

Len Schwalm showed a large sized picture book, "Battleships" by Paul Atwell. Nick Perrella passed around photos of miniature models on display at the San Diego Maritime Museum. Dave Roach's Pier Books will be publishing "Modeling Late Victorian Battleships" by Brian King (\$35). Other new titles available from Pier Books include "Bottled Up" (techniques for airplane models in bottles, \$12.95); Hudson's Bay Co. "Beaver" by John McKay, boxed with 42 sheets of plans (\$50); and a French publication of David Steele's "Naval Architecture" with a full set drawings from the engraved plates (\$100).
