Barry Rudd reported on a trip he recently made to Delaware to sail on the *Kalmar Nyckel* for a day. The ship (<u>http://www.kalnyc.org/</u>) is a replica of a vessel built in 1638 that was used to transport Scandinavian immigrants to the Delaware Bay area. The ship has a regular sailing schedule from Wilmington, Delaware.

Jan Leung attended his third meeting as a guest and was unanimously elected to membership. Welcome aboard, **Jan**!

Dave Watkins reported that he recently visited Oslo, Norway and while there visited the *Fram* Museum which contains the polar exploration ship within the museum. The *Fram* voyaged to both Polar Regions carrying expeditions headed by Fridtjof Nansen, Otto Sverdrup and Roald Amundsen in the late 19th and early 20th century.

The schooner **Gjøa** is also on display there. Amundsen sailed in this ship to make the first transit of the Northwest Passage in the waters and ice north of Canada.

Don Otis brought a clipping from the *Bergen Record* of August 13, 2002 containing an interesting article about our member, **Richard Balletto**. The article describes his long time interest in naval ships and his work on World War II model battleships on display at the Garfield Public Library on Midland Avenue.

SHOW AND TELL

Jan Leung brought his model in progress of a US Coast Guard 44 foot motor lifeboat built from a Dumas kit. Jan talked about his efforts to find the prototype vessels since the boat has been phased out by the Coast Guard. One boat is on display in Long Beach Township on Long Beach Island. Others are at the Coast Guard station on Sandy Hook.

Rich Lane showed his continuing work on the *L. A. Dunton*. Rich is scratch building this fine model of an American fishing vessel using plans from Mystic Seaport where the vessel is currently on display. (http://nimbus.mysticseaport.org/voyages/resources-11.html).

Art Joselson showed his updated model of the Dutch vessel *Friesland* built in 1666 (the original, not the model). This work is based on the Mamoli kit but is reduced to 1/4 the kit's size resulting in model length of 8 inches (a scale of 1:300).


Guest **John Cummings** brought a model steam boat which he plans to restore. The model has been in his family for many years and is currently not operational. The members gave **John** several suggestions about the steam engine and how to proceed with the project.

Henry Schaefer exhibited his scratch built model of the US Navy **YG 25**, a garbage collecting boat that operated at Portsmouth, NH. Built in 1" = 5' scale, the model is a fine rendering of this service craft which **Henry** actually served on.

Henry announced that owing to a change in his residence to Toms River, he may not be able to attend meetings in the future due to the distance involved. This announcement was met with chagrin by the members since **Henry** is an accomplished and prolific model builder. We will certainly miss his frequent Show and Tell discussions. We hope that he will find a way to meet with us from time to time.

We were very fortunate to have as our guest speaker **John Ziegler**, who competed in a two man rowing competition across the Atlantic Ocean. Thirty-eight identical boats built from kits provided by the sponsors entered the race. **John** and his partner finished eleventh after fifty-eight days at sea. John gave a fascinating slide show detailing the construction of the boat, the voyage and the happy conclusion. He also showed a beautiful and interesting video taken during the voyage.

Don Otis showed three volumes <u>of The Period Ship</u> <u>Handbook</u> by Keith Julier and published by the Naval Institute Press. These handbooks detail the construction of model wooden kits, mostly of European manufacture. A chapter is devoted to each kit. Additional chapters discuss tools, sails and technique. **Don** also showed a book titled <u>The</u> <u>Great Sailing Ships</u> edited by Franco Giorgetti published by Metro Books. This a "coffee table" book which focuses on twentieth century sail training ships and sailing cruise vessels.




