# MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING June 22, 2004

President **Ed Hegstetter** called the meeting to order at 7:35 PM with 21 members in attendance. The low number was probably due to the fact that the *Broadaxe* was unavoidably late getting out to the members. Everyone ought to remember that the meeting occurs on the fourth Tuesday of the month regardless of the status of the *Broadaxe*.

The *Broadaxe* was a major topic of discussion and rather than go through a report of all that was said, the results were positive and only need to be reported here. **Mike Gutsick** has generously volunteered to become the new editor of the *Broadaxe*. Mike is a relatively new member having attended his first meeting in September 2003. It is heartening to have such important participation from Mike. The job of the editor being resolved much of the aforementioned discussion centered on the need of the members to become involved in contributing to the content of the *Broadaxe* with shop notes, general hints, interesting websites, tools, interesting articles found elsewhere or anything of a related nature. The editor's job is then made much easier by having material to draw from other than what is reported in the minutes. The *Broadaxe*, to quote **Nick Starace**," is an integral part of our club and members must come forward and help if we are to continue to maintain the high degree of professional respect we enjoy within our modeling community."

The same thinking also applies to the Tech Sessions at meetings. Most members are aware that we have not had scheduled tech sessions at many recent meetings. A model show for 2004 was discussed. Jeff Herne reported that either the Parsippany or Wayne PAL facility would be considered for a show in late October/early November. The cost will be \$1,000 to rent the hall which can be defrayed by charging a small admission fee to visitors. It was agreed that Jeff Herne and Jeff Fuglestad will review the two sites and, depending upon availability, will settle on a date and site and report back to the members of their decision at the next meeting.

Our August 2 cruise on the MEERWALD has 20 persons signed up so far. # **SHOW AND TELL**

NICK STARACE brought two models to the meeting, neither of which he owns but are work he was commissioned to do for others. The first was an R/C model of a Darby tug with a fiberglass hull in 1:40 scale. The model measures 48 inches. The model was built by others but Nick was asked to re-engine the tug as the installed equipment was not adequate for a tug of this size and weight (some 65 pounds). The original motors and gears were undersized in power with too high a rate of propeller RPM. Nick installed new Robbe motors with low speed and high torque, eliminating the gearing to achieve a better scale speed for the model. In addition, Nick installed a variety of R/C features, engine sound, lighting, horn and a fire monitor that pumps water and rotates.

The second model Nick showed was a very old model (probably late 19<sup>th</sup> century) that was in very bad condition from age and an attack by a squirrel (the modelers equivalent of an attack from Moby Dick). Nick was asked to do a complete restoration without affecting the patina of age. Several broken masts and spars were repaired, deck furniture was either repaired or replaced as necessary, and the rigging was tightened and in some areas completely replaced. Finally the restored parts were painted / stained to match the existing parts and retain the aged look of the model. Nick is also having a case made to show the model.



HENRY SCHAEFER brought his work in progress of a New York built tug, *Ocean Prince*, built in 1956. This is the third model Henry has built of this attractive tug. The first two were given to family/ friends. He now wants a copy for himself. The model is scratch built in 3/8th scale from the original blueprints of the tug, which is owned by a friend. In fact, Henry was involved in a complete refit of the tug when it was purchased by his friend from Hess Oil. Henry has completed the plank on bulkhead hull and will go from there.





**TOM RUGGIERO** brought along his scratch built model in 1:96th scale of HMF *Liverpool* which we have seen from time to time as work progresses on this fine model. Tom has been working on the rudder and rudder fittings and discussed with the members his use of colored tape to represent the rudder strapping and the pintles and gudgeons which he thinks is very effective in this scale.







#### FROM THE EDITOR

As I finish this, my first inaugural issue as editor of the *Broadaxe*, I'm sure many are asking "Who is this guy"? As Tom McGowan pointed out earlier, I am a relative neophyte to both the club and to ship modeling. I am, in essence, just starting out on my path as a serious modeler. I am in constant awe of the craftsmanship and level of detail on display in the completed and work-in-progress models brought to the meetings I've attended. It is a level of skill that, as of now, I can only hope to attain.

I ask that the membership bear with me on this "shake down cruise" as I become more comfortable with the whole process and develop my own style of layout and text.

This may be old news, but in the area of interesting web sites, I came across a site while surfing one day for information on ship modeling and found the Ship Modelers Association located at <a href="www.ship-modelers-assn.org">www.ship-modelers-assn.org</a>. It has an interesting home page, a cross section of a warship. It has a good list of modeling tips on the site. Another site is run by Model Shipwrights located at <a href="www.modelshipwrights.net">www.modelshipwrights.net</a>. They publish a

quarterly journal on line called *Warships to Workboats* available as a download in pdf format. I've downloaded and printed them off and will bring them to the next meeting.

A word of caution while surfing the net – NEVER, NEVER assume that any site is safe. Always keep your virus definitions current and if you're running Windows XP, make sure you have all of the latest critical updates. I went to the Model Expo site last week and got peppered with files that were infected with a Trojan Horse virus (the site attempted to download 26 infected files to my computer). My Norton detected and quarantined the files so my computer was not infected. I called their customer service and informed them of the problem. I haven't been back since and am seriously considering ordering only through their toll free phone system. The particular virus had only been included in Norton's virus file the **day <u>before</u>** I visited the website. Talk about dodging a bullet!

Lastly, several of the members have suggested that there be added to the *Broadaxe* something akin to a Q & A section that that would be driven by direct input by the membership. I heartily agree and with this issue I will add a new feature section called "**Soundings from D Deck**". 
