BOOKS AND PUBLICATIONS

Our resident connoisseur of fine literature, **Don Otis**, had four books to discuss:

1.*The Billy Ruffian*: *The Bellerophon* and the *Downfall of Napoleon*, author David Cordingly and published by Bloomsbury in 2003. This book is a wonderful read about a 74 that survived several major battles.

2. *Nelson's Favorite: HMS Agamemnon at War 1781- 1809,* author Anthony Deane and published by Caxton. A cheaper reprint is available through the Scholar's Bookshelf.

3. Building Model Warships of the Iron and Steel Eras, edited by Peter Beisheim and published by the Naval Institute Press. Authoritative articles about every aspect from the building of a specific model to static or radio controlled models including an R/C submarine.

4. *The Boats of Men-of-War,* author W. E. May and published by Caxton. A cheaper reprint of the only book treating this subject

Dan Caramagno discussed *Castles of Steel* by Robert Massie and published by Random House. This is a good read and a must for anyone interested in early 20th century warfare.

SHOW AND TELL

Ozzie Thalmann has scratch built in 1/128 scale, a section of the *Bismarck's* number two turret, Bruno, featuring 15-inch guns that are motorized to train and elevate.

Dan Caramagno showed three vessels, *SMS Emden, HMS Good Hope* and *HMAS Sydney*. These pewter models in 1/ 2400 scale are actually war gaming models that Dan can work on during his business travels. The models are from GHQ and Viking Forge.

Henry Schaefer showed his completed scratch model of the whale factory ship *Willem Barendsz II*. Henry shows the waterline model at sea with whale carcasses alongside waiting to be processed.

Steve Fletcher had his scratch built work in progress of the U. S. Civil war river gunboat *Carondelet*. Steve has finished the deck, bulwarks and steering gear for this unique model.

Bill Liebold showed his scratch model in 1/256 scale of a South Korean vessel *KDXIII* that has not yet been built. **Bill** is a professional model maker at Lockheed Martin, and his fine models are used in design work.

Speaking of fine models, **Bob Fivehouse** brought his work in progress of the *Oceanis*, the first liner built for the White Star Line in 1871. **Bob** is working in his usual small scale of 1/ 32 inch to the foot and is guite creative in solving the problems associated with modeling at this scale.

Finally, Gary Kingzett showed some rough ventilation funnels for his scratch model of the battleship New Jersey (1906). At a previous meeting Gary had asked about electro plating sources. Due to environmental regulations plating shops have become scarce in New Jersey but Gary was able to find one that has made the funnels. Although rough in finish they may now be ground and polished to finished form.

Several of our members have submitted their work in past competitions. We hope that some other institution can take over this enterprise.

Getting to the PORT & STARBOARD CONVENTION CENTER

From Boston, using I 95 South:

- 1. Cross the Gold Star bridge into New London using the 4th lane from the left
- 2. Take exit # 83 onto FRONTAGE road, (not to downtown New London or Norwich).
- 3. About a quarter of a mile on Frontage road take the exit for Coleman Street.
- 4. Turn left at the traffic light. This is Colman Street. Follow it to the end (it becomes a one way street at Jefferson Street.)
- 5. At the end of Colman Street, (Boston Post Road) turn right and immediately turn left on to Lee Street. (The traffic light will hold approaching traffic for your left turn.)
- 6. Follow Lee Street to the end, one block, and turn right onto Great Neck Road (turns into Ocean Avenue in about 1.5 miles).
- 7. Follow to Bently Ave., the next to the last street. (Approximatelly 3 miles from Lee Street.)
- 8. Turn right and go into Ocean Beach Park gate in one block.

From New Haven, using I 95 North:

- 1. Take exit 82 off 1 95 North and turn right onto Broad Street, New London.
- 2. Stay on Broad Street for approximately 1 mile to the intersection with Colman Street. This intersection has a bunch of car dealers, Ford, Dodge/Jeep, General Motors, Deiwoo, Mercury. etc.
- 3. Turn right onto Coleman Street.
- 4. Follow the instructions above for Colman Street as if coming from Boston. (item#5)

Once in Ocean Beach Park:

Turn left inside the gate. You will see a large building straight ahead at the left end of the group of buildings. This is the Port and Starboard Hall. At the left end of the building you will see a small ramp up to the doors. This is where you can park temporarily while you off load your ship models. Parking for us is right across from that ramp. There is plenty of parking. If you are not bringing a model, the main entrance to the Hall is to the right of the building, under the canopy. Go up to the second floor and register for everything.


