



JEFF FUGLESTAD exhibited an early 20th century pond model of English origin which he has recently restored. The attractive model measures 36 inches and is plank on bulkhead construction.

ALLEN YEDLINSKY displayed his work in progress of the scratch built model of *HMS Roebuck* in 1/4 inch scale. Allen will give a Tech Session on construction of this model at a later date.






HENRY SCHAEFER brought his model of the US Coast Guard training ship *Eagle* built from scratch in 1/90th scale.





TOM RUGGIERO showed his continuing progress on the scratch built *HMS Liverpool* to demonstrate the gratings he has fabricated. We see this model often enough to feel as if we are building it but Tom's methods are instructive to us all.



DAN CARAGMANO had his model of the yacht *America*. Since last seen, Dan has installed a copper foil bottom on the model.





DMITRY AFONIN had two models with him. The first was a waterline model in 1:96 scale of the tug *Taurus* on which he made several modifications. Next, Dmitry showed his continuing work on the Midwest lobster smack which he is converting to a pleasure craft.





BOB FIVEHOUSE exhibited his work in progress of the scratch built model of the British vessel *Californian*. This ship's claim to fame is that it was near the *Titanic* the night she sank but was not aware of the *Titanic*'s situation. The model is in a scale too small to remember.



DAN PARISER showed his carvings of two figures, a helmsman and Ltcdr Woolsey from the US Brig *Oneida* posed next to a 24 pound long gun. Talk about small, Dan also showed a carving of Mr. Davey Jones in 1/24th scale, working on his model in 1/4 scale (that's 1/4 of 1/24) of a British 6th rate of 1690.
