MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING April 24, 2012



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BOOKS AND PUBLICATIONS

Larry Friedlander brought in a copy of the new book HMS Victory, the Owners Workshop Manual, published by Haynes, a British publishing company widely known for its' series of auto and motorcycle repair manuals. In theory this is the book you would get if you had brought HMS Victory. It presents itself as "an insight into owning, operating and maintaining the Royal Navy's oldest and most famous warship". The book contains a history of the building and career of *Victory*; then walks the "new owner" through the ship, explaining the layout and function of each of the decks. Along the way the owner is given instruction in how to perform various tasks such as hoisting the anchor, firing the guns, steering the ship and handling the sails. The final section of the book deals with the many forms of maintenance and repair required for the upkeep of a ship almost 150 years old. While the "manual" does not concern itself with modeling, the many excellent, colored pictures would be of great help to anyone building a model.

TECH SESSION




























Richard LaRue showed us his semi-scratch built, HO scale model of Lehigh Valley #462 railroad barge. Originally built in 1926, it stayed in service until it was scrapped in 1994. The barge was used to move railroad cars from the yards in New Jersey to the yards in lower Manhattan. After their use as railroad barges they became open-top scows, used for such tasks as hauling garbage. Richard scratch built his model using styrene and purchased parts such as the bollards and the window frames. He used plans and instructions found in a construction article in a railroading magazine. Richard scribed and distressed the plastic to give it the appearance of weathered planks. Lettering on the barge is re-created with decals printed by a friend. Richard also brought in his model of the covered barge "Amboy" which was owned by the New York Central Railroad and was used for moving freight from ship to shore and around the harbor. The model is built with a styrene hull, wooden bulkheads and cambered deck. The prototypes of both models were 90 to 100 feet long and about 32 feet wide.





At our meeting two months ago, <u>Chuck Bergman</u> brought in his first ever model of the *Peapod* and asked for help with the planking. Taking some of the offered advice, Chuck has finished his model of the working lobster boat. It is built to 7/8 of an inch to the foot scale and is about 12 inches long and a little under 4 inches wide.





For **Jeff Fuglestad** one model isn't enough. Jeff brought in two models of the Ranger, Harold Vanderbilt's Americas cup winning yacht. One is built to 3/16 inch to the foot scale and the other is being built to 1/8 inch to the foot scale. Jeff pointed out that club members who don't have a lathe could instead use a powered hand drill clamped in a vice. Clamp the brass rod in the drills' chuck and use files to shape the brass, working from the larger cross-section to the smaller until the desired shape is achieved. Jeff also suggests using a micro-torch instead of a soldering iron. Jeff carefully positions the pieces to be soldered, applies a small amount of flux and then places a very small piece of solder, perhaps a 64th of an inch square, in the flux and hits them briefly with the flame from the mini-torch. The flux sucks the solder into the gap and there is no fear that the brass will melt because the flame is applied so briefly. The masts on Jeff's models are made of popular, painted over with Testors aluminum spray paint. The yardarms are made of turned brass. Instead of using an X-Acto or a razor blade, Jeff has found a tool used by wallpaper hangers with very sharp blades that can be broken off when they go dull. Jeff used very thin but strong aircraft model wire to rig his Ranger. A lot of effort went into finding accurate plans, including trips to the New York Yacht Club and Mystic Seaport.


